Reforms of vocational education include the announcement of a New Zealand-wide Institute of Skills and Technology to replace existing polytechnics. The Minister's and the Tertiary Education Commission's statements about the future of the sector worry David Cooke. He writes here about

the narrow focus of their vision, which excludes concepts of the public good or public service. While vocational education should be informed by industry, it should not be instructed by it.
